In Fiscal Year 2013, SNAP provided about \$1.4 billion dollars in food benefits to a monthly average of 940,932 people in Virginia. The program served 84 percent of those eligible for benefits in Virginia in 2012. SNAP also has an economic multiplier effect; every dollar in new SNAP benefits results in \$1.80 in total economic activity.
